INCLUDED SOURCES OF INCOME (Includes total annual cash receipts before taxes from all sources)

1. Money wages and salaries before any deductions

- Net receipts from non-farm employment (receipts from a person's own unincorporated business, professional enterprise, or partnership, after deductions for business expenses)
- Net receipts from farm self-employment (receipts from a farm which one operates as an owner, renter, or sharecropper, after deductions for farm operating expenses)

8. NON-CASH BENEFITS

- (d) The imputed value of rent from owner-occupied non-farm or farm housing.
- (e) Federal non-cash benefit programs such as Medicare, Medicaid, Food Stamps, school lunches, and housing assistance.
